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# GOALS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

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## **1. We want to gain detailed insight of the current situation in the street area we work in.**

We mainly looked at the Abbossey Okai and Ablekuma sub metros in Accra. We conducted field surveys, did research on the subject and analysed the different stakeholders presently operating in our catchment area. We analysed as well the different profiles of children living on the street. This overview will help us to strategize our street work in 2019.

## **2. We want to readjust the profile of our children in the Drop-In Centre.**

With this aim, we started a school preparation program for those children who are in a relatively stable situation on the street. The outcome was quite successful: by the end of the year, 11 children were brought back to school and made way for new unattended children from the street.

## **3. We want to improve the success rate of children in our department Children Reunited.**

We reached a higher success by making positive use of the key influential people in the communities in which the children and their families live. We worked to strengthen the relationship between parents and children and between social workers and children, and we tried to reinforce parents' level of responsibility towards their children in different areas.

## **4. We want to make a five-year strategic plan for the organisation.**

After thorough discussions and analysis, our idea of a five-year strategic plan turned into our Vision 2020: we would like to open one new centre in the north and one in the centre of Ghana. We will also invest in prevention, networking among NGOs and the Government, and empowering families to take responsibility for their children. We would like to expand our street work program and start a new program called "Livelihood Empowerment".

## **5. We want to start building a data Management strategy.**

The first assessment of the actual data management processes in our organisation started in 2018 and will continue through 2019.





# LETTER FROM THE DIRECTORS

Dear Sponsors, Board, Staff and Friends,

Once again, we have gone through another successful year and with your support we continue to make a difference in the lives of many street children.

Throughout 2018, we were able to reach out to over 200 children whom we support in our various departments. Our staff continued to work tirelessly and guided by our principles ensured we attain our vision of empowering street children.

The total number of children that were reintegrated back to their families from all the departments rose to 22 compared to 15 last year. This was as a result of consistent efforts by the team to ensure that the children are reunited with their guardians. Out of this number, nine children joined their family without any further need for support from Chance for Children.

We continue to partner with other public and private organizations in order to ensure that children living on the streets get the necessary care they need. One of the key partnerships that were strengthened through the year was with SOS Ghana and other lead institutions, who decided to join forces with a view to finding a holistic and lasting solution to the increasing issue of street children in the country. The group is in the process of developing a powerful advocacy campaign next year which we hope can help address this issue.

As another example of a successful collaboration for the year 2018, KPMG, one of the leading auditing and consulting firms in Ghana, offered to carry out the audit of Chance for Children Ghana's financial statements on a pro bono arrangement. This represents an enormous gift to us since it implies great savings in favor of the children we work with.

Finally, we would like to thank our donors and partners for their faithful trust and support. And we want to also express our gratitude to our staff for their big heart, commitment and energy to always ensure that we bring transformation to the lives of the children that pass through our organization.

# 2018 HIGHLIGHTS

## A newly developed school preparation program

We developed a criteria catalogue and a questionnaire for assessing the children visiting our Drop-In Centre. The goal of this questionnaire was to find out which children can be prepared to go back to school while living with their families on the street. This means that, even if the child is in a vulnerable situation, there will be an adult relative or neighbour that can provide him or her with protection and monitoring.

With our newly developed School Preparation Program, we were able to ensure that 11 children attending our Drop-In Centre could go back to the formal school sector. This additional program prepares them for re-entering school by reinforcing their necessary concentration skills, behaviour patterns, time management and much more. The family members were also trained on minimum parenting standards, including waking the child up on time, controlling their movements to school, nurturing their relationship, getting assistance for the child's homework, etc.



## Tribal Festival with Ecobank

On the 17 of November 2018, we celebrated our Annual Tribal Festival. The children and housemothers in our Homes in Hebron dressed up, danced and performed the dances, songs and costumes of different tribes in Ghana. We had some special guests of honour and children's relatives who graced us with their presence. The performance was followed by a buffet of delicious dishes from all over Ghana.

This delightful day was closed by the visit of around thirty Ecobank's employees who came to Hebron as part of their annual program called Eco Bank Day. They brought a donation of a full computer lab including 20 computers, besides food items, stationaries and other gifts.

### **Piano Melodies at the Drop-In Centre**

On the 6 of December 2018 the renowned classical pianist and composer Panos Karan came to perform at our Drop-In Centre as part of his Keys of Change project, which is bringing music all around the world.

He encouraged the children with his beautiful music and his very impressive life story. We were all thrilled by this visit and were left with his wise words to reflect on: "Music is one of the simplest yet strongest ways for individuals around the world to build bridges for peace and make a positive social change."



# STREET WORK

This year, our street team —composed by four street workers— interacted daily with the street children in the areas of Agbogbloshie, Konkomba, Sikkens, Kantamanto, Railways and Kaneshie in Accra. Overall, the street workers had over 4,000 face-to-face contacts with children living on the streets. They strove to empower all these children in different ways:

11 boys and girls could be guided back to school as part of our new School Preparation Program and were closely monitored by our workers from then on.

The street workers built strong relationships with the children, street-connected adults and authorities like police officers, community leaders and school principals. We realized that it is very important to raise awareness on this topic also among adults, because they are key players with a big influence on the children. With this in mind, new booklets on "Bonding with Children" and "The Importance of Enrolling Children in School" were created and distributed and workshops on these topics were organised for adults on the streets.

The Christmas party on the street took place at the onion market on the 22 of December

2018 with a massive attendance: 75 girls and 33 boys joined the party, making a total number of 108 children. Everyone had fun and we used the opportunity to remind them about the benefits of coming to the Drop-In Centre.

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# CHILDREN REUNITED



We started the year with the aim of developing the relationship between teenagers and their parents while continuing to ensure that the home remains a safe and conducive environment for the kids.

To this end, the social workers in the department put all their efforts to increase the effectiveness of their visits, counselling and guidance

to the families. They have thus enhanced their proactivity, improved communication between them and the families, educated both parents and children about each other's rights and responsibilities, and started making use of influential people in the communities to assist in the upbringing of children.

As a result, a general improvement has been observed in the relationship between parents and children and there is much more stability in most of the homes, which ensures that the children grow up in a safe and loving setting.

The nurses of some communities gave the teenage girls some training on reproductive health. This was welcome news for most of the teenage girls who have reached the age of puberty and find it difficult to understand the changes their bodies goes through.

The number of successfully released children in the department was four, out of which two graduated from Senior High School and the other two did an apprenticeship. We also had some challenges with two other children and their families which led to the premature withdrawal of their sponsorship.

The total number of children in the department now stands at 45, 17 of which are girls. 29 of these children attend basic school, while 15 are in Senior High School or pursuing vocational education or apprenticeship.

# DROP-IN CENTRE

The Drop-In Centre has the goal to release street children between six and fourteen years from the pressure on the street. It welcomes a maximum of 45 children a day, who receive here a hot meal, basic healthcare, psychological counselling and the opportunity to attend classes and handcraft workshops. In addition, they can take a shower, wash their clothes, play with other kids or simply relax in a protected setting, a luxury they do not often get to experience.

Besides our existing programs, we introduced new activities for smaller groups of children, and a specific program for those girls who work at the onion market:

**Early Morning Games:** A special program for those children who, due to their circumstances, come to our centre very early in the morning. A social worker attends to them and gets them involved in creative activities and games.

**Social Games:** Games through which the children develop social skills.

**School Preparation Program:** It prepares the children who are in a relatively stable setting on the street to go back to school. The children are selected for this program based on a questionnaire and an assessment of their family and living situation.

**Time Management Workshop:** It teaches them to read time and how to spend time wisely.

**Program for Girls at the Onion Market:** This is a special program for girls who are moving in groups and are working under special conditions. Depending on the onion harvest season, these girls have sometimes a lot of work and cannot come on time to the regular classes, at others they cannot find any work to do, or sometimes yet they are moved to a different area, so they are very irregular.



# HEBRON HOMES

Our quest to offer the children the best alternative care besides the family environment while striving to reunite them with their families continue to be the hallmark that drives the work in the Hebron home.

This year a total of 16 new children were admitted to the Hebron Home, out of which nine were boys and seven were girls. This huge intake was mainly due to the Government of Ghana's operation named "Get off the street now for a better life!". 11 of the children that were rescued from the streets were brought to the Hebron Home through an arrangement by the management of Chance for Children and the Ministry of Women, Gender and Social Protection. Unfortunately, despite all the efforts, four of these kids could not adapt to the Hebron environment and subsequently decided to leave. The other seven are currently doing very well.

In line with of our goals to ensure that our children are finally reunited with their families, four boys and three girls were reintegrated with their families during 2018. Follow-up visits by our social workers indicate that they have settled down well in their family and community and are readjusting successfully.

This year three children (one boy and two girls) sat for the Basic Education Certificate Examination and they performed very well. For the first time one of our girls had aggregate six which is considered be a distinction. It is the best grade we have had to date.

"Money Handling" lessons were held for some selected number of children. The goal was to teach in the various ways of handling money including saving, investing, budgeting and spending. A professional from the financial sector was invited to share some experiences with the children.

As we have been doing for the past two years, our yearly Tribal Festival, which is organized to showcase everything that the children have learned throughout the year about their tribes and culture, also took place on the 17 November 2018. It was a very colourful event and the children were thrilled to display their new knowledge. The whole program ended with a variety of local dishes from all the tribes.

Parent/Guardian Meeting was held twice in the year, April and November, to discuss various challenges about parenting and about how to build a better relationship between the guardians and the organization. Many of the parents/guardians attended the meeting.

On weekends, activities such as creativity workshops, outdoor and indoor sports, etc. were organized to equip the children with skills while also promoting a healthy lifestyle. The ME and JOBS Program, developed by the IPE (International Projects in Education) of the Pedagogic University of Zurich to help children choose one day their professional career, were conducted mostly on weekends with some selected kids.

Likewise, Life Skills and Health workshops were held quarterly to discuss topical issues among the children such as time management, negotiation skills, etc.

During the vacation periods in April and August, most of the children were delighted to spend time with their family or guardians. Many of them returned with very good memories of their visits. For those staying in the Homes, different educational and entertainment activities were held to ensure that the children had a relaxing and fun vacation. They even had the opportunity to make a fantastic trip to the Akosombo dam in the Eastern Region.

Finally, in December our kids were invited to sing at the Mövenpick Hotel Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony. They really enjoyed the experience and were pleased to sing some of their favourite Christmas songs to the invited guests.



# YOUTH & GRADUATES

## Youth

The number of young boys and girls being supported by Chance for Children in their path to an independent life has increased to five from three this year. Two of them joined from our Home in Hebron, while one who was previously supported in the family came back to the organisation as a result of poverty and neglect from his family. One graduated as a barber. Two are in secondary school while the other two are making an apprenticeship.

## Graduates

A questionnaire was given to those who have graduated from CFC within the five previous years. The number of people who have graduated during this period is 23; 21 of them responded to the questionnaire.

The total number of graduates who are working is 16, representing 76% (a 6% reduction from last year's figures). This decrease is due to the fact that some of the graduates went back to school (increasing the percentage of those pursuing further education by 9%). Consequently, there was a 9% reduction on the percentage of graduates who could live on their earnings, and a 11% decrease in those who are supporting others.

# PRODUCTION & SALES



In 2018 we had the goal to implement the production concept developed in 2017.

Mainly, we focused on the goal of reflecting on the meaningful involvement of the children in the production of our handicrafts, so that they learn local handicrafts, explore their talents and interests, work in an organized and well-structured environment and engage in the activity with fun and motivation. This means concretely to consider which steps of the production process for each handicraft should be done by our children.

In order to ensure the continuity of a meaningful participation of our boys and girls, we first documented the procedure of some products, step by step. We also looked for the right setting, such as the

arrangement in the room, the number of children and the auxiliary materials needed to include more children in a meaningful way.

On another note, we had the goal to develop a new, consistent, attractive branding for our handicraft which would carry the name of an innovative, developing, modern, thoughtful and environmentally-friendly organization to our clients. We got this done and are looking forward to presenting it in the coming year.

As part of our concept, we decided that we will no longer sell any handicrafts which have not been created by ourselves, so those kinds of products in stock were dismissed by end of the year.

Lastly, we are happy to share with you that one of the girls living in our Home in Hebron showed interest in learning how to produce tie and dye materials, so she has been coming to our Drop-In Centre a few times a week. She enjoys learning and working together with the other children and seems to have found the job and environment in which she can flourish.

# PROGRAMS

At Chance for Children we have six programs running in our five different departments: Health, Education, Emotional and Social Development, Reintegration, Volunteers and Handicrafts. Each program follows a concept or a procedure and is run by a Program Coordinator.



A new training under the Education program called "Money Handling" was piloted with some children in

our Home in Hebron. The goal for these lessons was that teenagers leaving Hebron learn to handle money responsibly. The lessons were held during the vacation weeks and involved combining classroom work with practical experience. The topics that were addressed included earning money in a responsible way, making good spending decisions, developing and handling a budget, banking, ways and means to save money, investing, borrowing and lending money and using mobile money.

Additionally, a resource person from Ecobank was invited to share some experiences with the children. Looking for yet another way to create awareness about income and expenses, the children were also tasked to monitor their expenses over a one-month period. At the end of the workshop, these young boys and girls developed their own yearly budget for the purchase of clothing and went to the market to buy these products.

During some of the discussion sessions, most of the teenagers brought in some of their experiences relating businesses they engaged in from their previous life on the street. At the end, the kids showed a lot of interest and were highly motivated to develop their business skills. Based on the success of the pilot project and the interest raised among the participants, we are planning on expanding it further to other age groups and departments.

# VISION 2020

The children who live on the streets in Accra come from almost all regions in Ghana. These are boys and girls who leave their home in search of a better life in the capital of Ghana. Sometimes they come alone, sometimes with a friend or a relative. Some of these children are ready and willing to go back to their families or to a relative; some have got so used to the street life that they prefer to stay.

Our final goal is to reunite children with their families when the conditions are favorable. Time-consuming trips have to be made by our social workers to connect with the families of the children and to examine or enable a possible reintegration. Currently we support children in almost all regions in Ghana, which means that our team travel far distances too.

Therefore, there is a need for reintegration into the families in the North and in the Centre of Ghana, and the expansion of our work locations will greatly contribute to meet this need. The positive effects of the expansion of CFC locations are explained as follows:

**A:** Empowering the families: The reasons that street life is the only option for a child are mainly due to the family situation. For a child to be able to return at all, not only the child but also the family has to be empowered. Thanks to the expansion of our work sites, the support and qualification of families will be strengthened both quantitatively and qualitatively in the different regions.

**B:** Prevention work will be done so that children do not end up on the streets of Accra. The rural exodus is thus specifically fought.

**C:** Networking and identification of causes as well as further development of strategies that counteract the problem of street children.

**D:** Cost and time savings: By having CFC on-site, employees can spend their time more efficiently and effectively. The travel times will be massively shortened and the care of the children and their families on site will be intensified.







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# LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT (CFC ASSOCIATION)

More than 160 children and adolescents have been supported in 2018. # ACTIVITIES IN SWITZERLAND

Throughout the year, the group of CFC Friends organized different events, workshops and sales of handicrafts. In September the leadership of the group changed from Simone Rüegg to Melanie Troxler. Now, besides leading the group of CFC Friends, Melanie Troxler also supports the fundraising activities and events management in Switzerland.

In May, Awuley and Laura hosted different events in Switzerland. Since Laura comes from the town of Langenthal, they focused on the canton of Bern and the area around of it. They also travelled to Germany, where Christiane, a former volunteer, organized several events in Alzenau and Gelnhausen. It was a great chance for reaching to new possible donors in this neighbour country.

In August, Daniela was in Switzerland and enjoyed seeing all CFC Friends, networking, visiting donors and creating awareness of the situation of street children in Ghana and the difference that Chance for Children is making for them. Beside fundraising events, Daniela had different meetings where she exchanged about important factors to observe and look at on the Growth Journey of CFC.

The entire Board has made major efforts to develop the best structure in Switzerland that allows us to expand our work in Ghana, assisting better and more street children. In the General Assembly, held in August 2018, the members of the association Chance for Children voted that the Board can work on a plan to become a foundation. In consideration of the support received by this initiative, the entire Board has been working hard and is looking forward to presenting this project in the next Extraordinary General Assembly that will take place on the 16 February 2019.



# COLLABORATION WITH UNIVERSITIES



Last May a team of CFC employees, namely Laura, Daisy, Tony, Hannah and Awuley participated in a stimulating five-days training at the PH Zürich, in Switzerland. The focus of this training session was laid on democratization.

At the end of the week two of our volunteers, Isabel and Riu, organized a great event in Luzern, where we showed the short movies that Riu had shot at the beginning of the year in Ghana (you can watch all five videos at our News/Media section in our website). The audience welcomed the screening with a great interest and many questions about what we do in Ghana. It was an inspiring experience for our staff to realize how much people appreciate their work.

Back in Ghana, Martina and Fabienne, students from the University of Teacher Education Luzern spent some weeks with us in August. During this time they successfully completed a project assignment as part of their specialisation course "Pedagogical Development Cooperation".

Gina, who is studying Social Work at the University of Applied Sciences in Bern, began her internship with us in August in our Home in Hebron and will end it in January 2019. One of our social workers works closely with her and guides her in achieving her previously set goals.

In November, Manuel and Keith, professors from the PH Zürich, visited us for a week. Manuel made a first overview of all our internal processes in order to develop a Case Management Database which will be further developed in 2019. As for Keith, he worked as a coach and discussed with our social workers and teachers about peer support, lesson reflections and dealing with children's learning difficulties. Furthermore, he imparted a new teachers' trainers' session.



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# FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

## Income

Chance for Children is being financially supported by more than 2,700 individuals, 12 foundations, 130 churches, schools, associations and companies. Donors reside primarily in Switzerland and Liechtenstein, but there are also donors from Germany, Austria, Ghana, France, Canada and the United States.

Donations in 2018 summed up to CHF 674,227, 15% higher than last year. Around CHF 16,632 of the donations have been generated in Ghana.

Children and youth in CFC were able to contribute almost CHF 22,000 by helping produce as well as selling cards, batiks and other goods. This also includes the income generated through giving workshops.

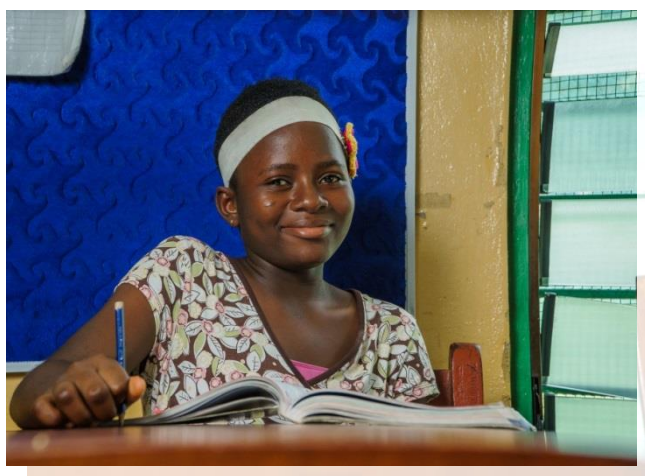
Contributions from annual membership fees from 200 members of the Swiss association Chance for Children summed up to CHF 6,670.

## Recurring Expenses

Total current expenses in 2018 were CHF 544,981, 18% higher than in 2017. The quality improvement in care taking in our Homes and the high inflation rate in Ghana are driving the increase.

Around 90% of the donations & contributions are directly benefiting children and youth in CFC. These are expenses for school fees, food, clothes, care taking, transportation as well as accommodation for the children.

The current expenses for the 160 children are about CHF 544,981, which means about CHF 3,406 per child.



## 2018 Investments

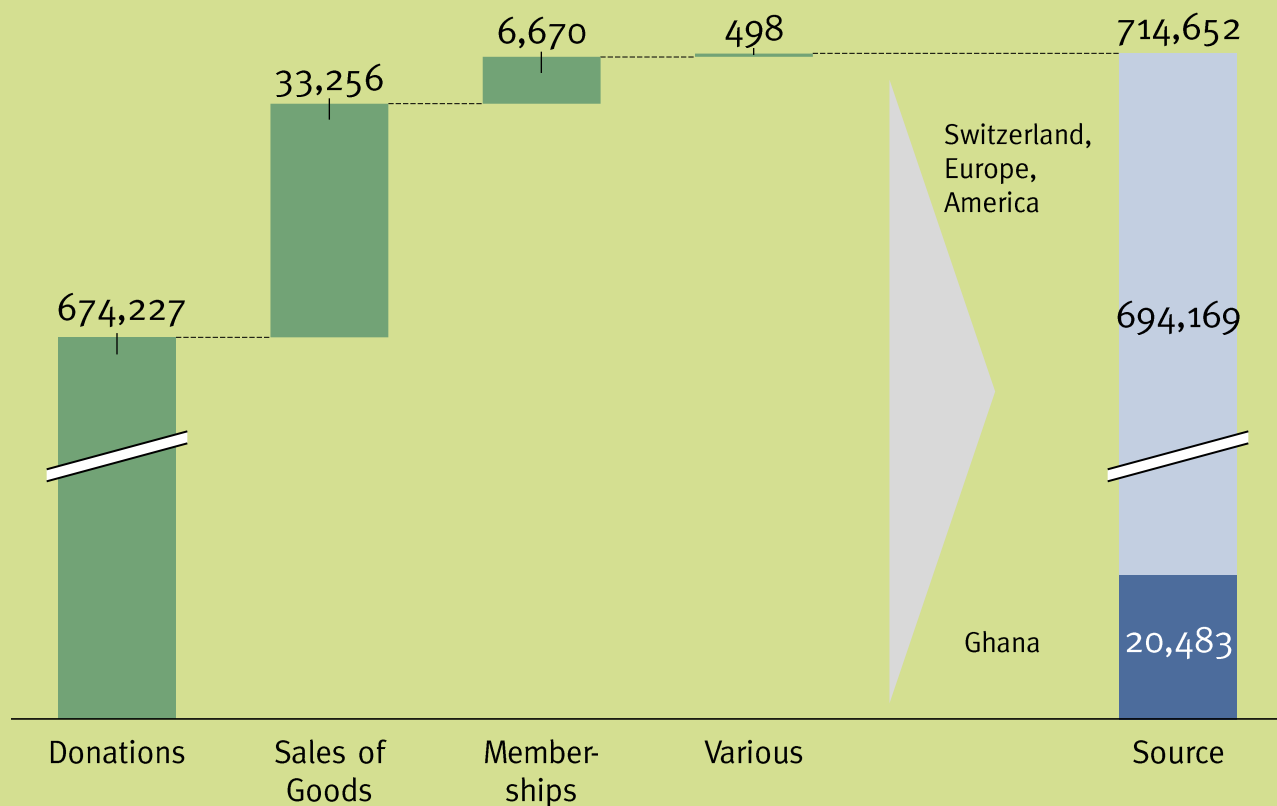
Investments in 2018 sum up to CHF 17,143 and are driven by building a new street to the houses and new furniture and office equipment.

## Reserves

The management and staff of CFC are very much aware of the long-term responsibility for children we support. For this reason it was a major goal for CFC to build up some reserves.

Chance for Children reserves sum up to CHF 1,167,055 and ensure covering the recurring costs for more than two years.
